First Term Achievements (2017-21)

Stopped Excessive Heights; resisted pressure from the former mayor to support 14 storeys in Lindfield. Lindfield Village Green; listened to residents and businesses, increased short stay parking spaces from 80 to 136 and increased lifts from 1 to 2.

Worked with residents and staff to introduce otpath and traffic improvements.
Supported residents and worked effectively with

State Members in lobbying for Roseville and Killara Station lifts and increased train services.

Supported netball lighting at Canoon Road, the upgrade of Norman Griffiths, and St Ives Basketball. Helped initiate the revival of Marian Street Theatre.

Updated apartment development controls to encourage **communal rooftop gardens**. *Plus motions to be considered in November.*

Increasing the basketball hoops in Roseville, Lindfield and Killara from 5 to at least 12.

Increasing netball court availability at Tryon Road.
Saving Bates Park from sale to property developers.
Mandate for a Pedestrian Bridge in Lindfield.

Second Term Objectives (2021-24)

- → Consider safety in **new footpaths** prioritisation.
- → Build the Lindfield Village Hub, no stuffing around.
- → Retain Roseville Chase Bowling site for recreation.
- → Improve financial sustainability by reviewing council's operating cost structure.
- → Improve Council's notification practices by updating the Community Participation Plan.
- → Conduct a **future needs analysis of sporting facilities**, seeking input from all codes.
- → Reduce emissions by **improving energy efficiency**. → Amend Council's development controls to reduce the impact of development on tree canopy.
- → Establish **electric vehicle charging infrastructure**. → Explore modest options for residents to downsize
- to townhouses or duplexes without leaving the LGA.
- → Ensure diverse community participation in the Community Strategic Plan & other council decisions.
- → Align General Manager Performance Reviews with Office of Local Government Guidelines, setting ambitious but realistic performance targets and holding the General Manger to account.
- → Break the dysfunctional cycle of the casting vote through a 2024 referendum on council composition.

Infrastructure and Accountability

Getting the Right Balance

When considering complex issues such as infrastructure policy, we must consider the diverse range of needs of people who live in this area, both present and future.

The pandemic has changed how we work and play. The local experience has become more important and we must do whatever we can to protect existing open space and acquire more. I have also spoken to residents who want to downsize while staying in Ku-ring-gai; some want to live in a low maintenance townhouse or duplex rather than an apartment with shared ventilation, however these are rare in Ku-ring-gai and our Development Control Plans must be amended to ensure that future townhouses and duplexes are in keeping with local character.

We care about issues such as traffic management, commuter parking, and safely dropping off our kids at school. Some of us also value quality footpaths, access to reliable transport, amenities, and local green space.

We will listen to local community concerns, seek a balanced position, then work with all levels of government to reach a collaborative outcome.

Financial Sustainability

With demand for services growing faster than the rates that Council collects, Council has relied on asset sales to fund maintenance and projects. However once sold the land is gone forever, and while asset sales may support Council's short-term needs, they do not address underlying issues with Council's cost structure meaning that more needs to be sold next decade.

We will improve Council's financial sustainability by reviewing its operating cost structure.

Organisational Performance and Accountability

While most residents are satisfied with council services, those who are dissatisfied state low accountability, poor communication and organisational culture as issues. We therefore seek to:

Align Performance Management Practices with Office of Local Government (OLG) Guidelines. Ku-ring-gai is the only council in Sydney's North that does not follow OLG guidelines on having a panel of multiple councillors set the General Manager's performance agreement. Instead, the former mayor alone had set the agreements with easy targets, and many attempts by other councillors to contribute to the agreement had been disregarded. Aligning with OLG guidelines will give councillors a greater say in Ku-ring-gai's performance and culture.

Update the Community Participation Plan to improve notifications on major works. Earlier this year, major changes to the Lindfield Town Centre were considered without notification letters being sent to all affected residents. While staff said it was not required, we disagree and will change this practice.

Ensure diverse community participation in setting the Community Strategic Plan, which sets Council's priorities at the start of term. Last term's participation was low compared to Willoughby, resulting in a plan to 2038 that was almost identical to the plan to 2030.

Tip of the Iceberg?

Once or twice each year (pre-covid), the councillors and senior council staff held a two-night retreat at Bells at Killcare to discuss matters and socialise. After attending once and discovering your ratepayer cost, Sam vowed to stop staying overnight and proposed more cost-effective venues. The retreats were subsequently moved to weekdays to slightly reduce cost, however the retreats remain at Bells.

Major Projects Update

Lindfield Village Green

After talking to local residents and businesses, we amended the design to increase the short stay parking spots from 80 to 136, allowing more patrons and visitors to the area. We



also increased the number of **lifts from 1 to 2** to ensure that there would always be 1 operational. Due to COVID and the substantial design changes requiring development approval, delivery has been delayed to January 2022.

Lindfield Village Hub — This project has faced significant cost and delay. The last two years under COVID are understandable; project capital had frozen, many developers lost interest, and without competitive tension council was not receiving offers that provided good ratepayer value. However, prior to COVID there was more than a one-year delay when council spent money to promote a 14-storey design which Sam had objected to.

With an improved financial environment, we are keen to build the Village Hub along with a pedestrian bridge, however the

assumptions still require careful scrutiny.

Roseville Chase Bowling Green

In 2018 all councillors supported the staff

recommendation to sell this site for redevelopment, however with changes from the pandemic, a clearer understanding of how hard it is to acquire new land, and a deeper understanding of council's finances our team is now of the view that the site should be retained for recreation. Sam also sought to assess the heritage value of the site in May 2021 but this was not supported by the majority of councillors.

Environment and Social

Sam Ngai

I have lived in Roseville, Killara and East Lindfield for the last 34 years. I attended Roseville Public and my wife attended Lindfield Public. We have two young daughters, and our parents all live in Roseville.



I studied Engineering and Accounting at UNSW, am a qualified accountant (CPA), and graduated at the Australian Institute of Company Directors with top marks. I am currently completing my MBA at AGSM (exchange at Oxford).

I work in Risk & Internal Audit at Origin and serve as a Director at StateCover, a Local Government Insurer.

My wife and I also run a wedding and family portrait photography business; we understand and care about small business.

I volunteer as the Treasurer at East Lindfield Community Preschool, as Secretary at KYDS Youth Development Service in Lindfield, and in children's ministry at St Barnabas Roseville East.

Supporting our Vulnerable

During the pandemic, Council did what it could to point volunteers and donors to organisations such as the Ku-ring-gai Neighbourhood Centre, Meals on Wheels and KYDS Youth Development Service. These not-for-profits need your help today and would appreciate your time or money.



Roads, Footpaths and Cycleways

While the NRMA's Rate Your Road report found roads in Ku-ring-gai's to be in the best condition, our delivery of new footpaths is another matter. Council spends \$1m a year on new footpaths and it's extremely embarrassing to tell residents that the footpath they requested won't be coming until 2024, 2027, or never at all. If elected, we will increase the footpaths budget and also require safety to be a key consideration when prioritising which footpaths to build first.

Ku-ring-gai will expand its network of Cycleways under its town centre plans, to be approved in 2022.

Provision of Sporting Facilities

Like many residents, we appreciate the benefits of community sport for physical, social and mental health. However, Council faces the challenge of providing capacity for all sports. We will work with each sporting code to conduct a local supply and demand analysis for all sporting facilities, identifying further opportunities to increase capacity and encourage our residents to remain fit and healthy. At the same time, we recognise the impact that extending sportsground use may have on local residences and believe that in order to be good neighbours, Council should jointly work with neighbours to identify appropriate mitigations.

Reducing Waste to Landfill

In 2017, Sam asked Council to investigate soft plastic recycling, however the only provider in Australia was at full capacity.



Environmental Initiatives

Council is already targeting Net Zero by 2040 and 100% renewable by 2025 but more can be done. As an early Electric Vehicle adopter, Sam understands the challenges preventing uptake. In 2021, Council



We recognise the **importance of tree canopy** in keeping us cool, providing us with fresh air, and providing wildlife with homes. If elected, we will amend Council's DCP to **reduce the impact of development on tree canopy**.

Ku-ring-gai's Housing Strategy

In the last two years, all metro councils were required to lodge plans to support diverse housing needs to 2036. Council staff proposed 20 storey residential, which all councillors rejected, and the video and minutes of the September 2020 Council meeting confirms this. However there was a divergence on best way forward.

- Sam then proposed that with declining immigration, a lower dwelling target should be set. No heights greater than existing LGA limits and a small increase of townhouses and duplexes as requested by residents. The revised plan was to then go out for public consultation before approval, as per usual process.

Sam objected to this approach. By not considering zoning changes to support townhouses, duplexes, seniors living or childcare in sensible locations, Sam believed that Council abdicated its responsibility to plan carefully in consultation with the public, leaving us exposed to spot rezoning by developers in inappropriate locations. A July 2021 State Government letter confirmed that the plan alone did not sufficiently provide the housing diversity required to 2036 and that if Council will not do its part, the developers will. We believe that councillors are elected to consult and lead, not pass the buck.
